Letter from Andrew Housley

Dear Friends,

In June 1994 I was preparing to be commissioned as an evangelist in the Church Army at Sheffield Cathedral, and in June 2002 I was preparing to be ordained in Liverpool Cathedral. When we get to the month of June, I reflect upon both those life-changing events in my life.

In 1994, I would often walk with friends to Woolworths in Sheffield for a 'Super 7' fry-up. These days, I'm more likely to meet clergy friends at Hartley's for breakfast, usually smoked salmon and scrambled egg on granary toast. In 1994, I would listen to Oasis and watch Four Weddings and a Funeral. Today, I listen to the Radio 4 Today programme and go to the cinema with the family to watch The Avengers, Age of Ultron.

In 2002, I would wait for the internet to connect so that I could send a rare email. Today, I reply to emails throughout the day on my mobile phone. In 2002, I would listen to CDs, but today I can listen to any music I like via the computer, tablet, or phone.

We all experience tremendous change throughout our lives. Some change may seem to be good, while some change may seem to be bad.

In both parishes, we are fortunate to have an Shared Ministry Team (SMT) and Parochial Church Council (PCC) who are able to be creative in reflecting and discussing how we develop as a church. We are fortunate to maintain both traditional and modern forms of worship and ministry within the benefice. It's important to hold on to what is good, while responding to the changes in life and society. Neither the political or commercial world would stand still and ignore the change which surrounds us, neither should the church.



Throughout our lives, we need to face change knowing that our Christian faith is an anchor. We are held in Christ's unchanging presence, by a God who is faithful to us. We are anchored in his presence, so that we may face the challenges which this changing world brings.

Bickerstaffe Colliery Cycle Trails: Community Open Day 20th June 11am to 3.00pm



Do you remember the spoil heap of the old Bickerstaffe colliery? It has now been totally transformed into new and exciting mountain bike trails with a footpath around the edge to enable both cyclists and pedestrians to enjoy this picturesque woodland setting.

To celebrate the 1st anniversary of the opening of the trails, Bickerstaffe Parish Council is holding a Community Open Day, to which all members of the parish are especially invited to come along and see the amazing facility which has been created in our Parish.

There will be displays of mountain bike riding and the opportunity for youngsters to bring their bikes along to have a mountain bike masterclass! The day will be a chance for the community to get together, have a look at the trails, take a walk along the new footpath, and much more.

If coming by car, you can park at the Parish Field car park by the football clubhouse, and walk down the public footpath beyond the Church (to the left of the church as you face it). The trails are signposted from there. Once you reach the trails, walk along the wooded area towards Rainford Road, and enter at the signposted point - please do not use the cyclists' entrance prior to this which does not pick up the footpath, and it is where cyclists emerge at speed. Please stick to the footpath and do not trespass onto surrounding farmland – there will be signs up to direct you.

The Trails can also be accessed via the entrance opposite Quattro's Restaurant. If parking in the lay-bys on Rainford Road, please be

considerate and do not block the restaurant or farm entrances which are in constant use. There are detailed maps showing the correct route on Bickerstaffe Cycle Trails Facebook page.

Please note that this is an outdoor woodland venue, suitable footwear for the uneven ground, and outdoor gear in case of inclement weather are recommended and that we are unable to provide toilets and seating facilities on the site.

We hope that you will take this opportunity to see the Trails and enjoy the footpath, and we look forward to seeing there.

'When Bickerstaffe hit the road' by Sheila Beeby



Reading our vicar's enthusiastic comments on the "joys of caravanning" brought to mind the fun and laughter we shared when Bickerstaffe had its very own Caravan Club.

In the 1970s when Mr Brian Marshall was head teacher at our school and I was the secretary of the Parent Teacher Association, we realised that many of our school families owned caravans. I was asked to organise a weekend away, and so the "Bickerstaffe PTA Caravan Club" was born, with about a dozen very enthusiastic families including 26 children.

Fitting in with my family's hobby of vintage steam rallying, it seemed a good idea that our first club outing was to attend the Morecambe Bay steam rally at Stodday, near Lancaster. In those days, organisers hadn't cottoned on to the fact that having touring caravans on site was a good source of income and it took some persuading to allow our club to be sited on the field - it's now BIG business.

This venue proved most successful as dads enjoyed the old exhibits and mums had markets stalls to wander round. Children simply had a good time as in those days, it was safe for them to freely roam. In between these activities we visited Glasson Dock and a haunted house for afternoon tea, and fitted in a village walk (where some of us were returned to the site by tractor and trailer!) - and all for the huge sum of £5 for the weekend.

This was the first of many such weekend outings for our caravanners over the next few years. We travelled to Howarth, Yorkshire where we ended up axle-deep in mud on a farm field! But the rain didn't dampen our enjoyment as the farmer gave us the use of his barn shop for our

evening entertainment of a film show, wine tasting, darts and dominoes. In Cheshire we stayed on a friend's farm near Chester, where we walked the 2 miles round the historic walls (and visited the shops!) before returning for our evening's fun. Here we also visited the village church of St Oswald and had a demonstration of bell ringing by yours truly (ringing the same bell as in my teens) followed by an athletic crawl up the spiral stone steps to the top of the bell tower. On another occasion, we stayed at Pickmere, near Knutsford, with the owner opening up the lake for us to enjoy a sail. Another weekend was to "Marbury Merry Days" (near Whitchurch) to share their centenary gala with parades and river pageant. At a vintage rally near Wrexham, North Wales some of us attended Sunday morning church with the whole service conducted in Welsh - but the singing was lovely! Here their 10 choir members outnumbered the congregation until we arrived.

News from Bickerstaffe Church of England School



Stories from Islamic and Middle Eastern traditions. On a sunny day in April (yes, there was one!) children listened attentively to Alia Alzougbi, a storyteller who was also able to tell the children about her first-hand experience of the conflict in the Middle East. Her family escaped from Lebanon during the 1982

Israeli Invasion, then moved to Iraq and fled to Baghdad during the Gulf War. After moving to Jordan and then Syria, they settled back in Lebanon.

She used story to encourage children to explore their perceptions about racial differences, and the children asked some very thoughtful questions. Alia's work has seen her: win the 2011 'Best Storyteller' award by the Fringe report; nominated for a BAFTA Scotland; and appear on BBC Arabic Television and Radio, so this was a fantastic opportunity for our children to learn about a different culture and the traditions of the people who follow the teaching of Islam.

Science Fieldwork. Fieldwork was undertaken by Class 3 in 'Colliery Woods' this term. Good observational skills were in evidence, as they located and identified different plants and trees. There was also evidence that Bickerstaffe School had visited the woods in the past! Clumps of daffodils could be seen (although the flower heads had faded) and these were planted by school children under the direction of PC Woods many years ago.

SuperStars. Well done to all our competitors! They enjoyed the experience of taking part in a large event with children from different schools. Individually there were some 'star performances' at the different bases, and Reuben Warwick was awarded a 'Silver Medal' for achieving the second highest score overall in the 'Year 6 Boys' category.



Orienteering. It was cold and windy, but a great opportunity for team building, problem solving, and map reading when Class 4 spent the morning developing their orienteering skills.

Sats. As I write this article our Year 6 pupils are part way through 'Sats Week', the time of year when they strive to put down on paper all that they have learned during their time at Primary School; and achieve the best mark that they can in Reading, Writing, Mathematics and Grammar, Punctuation & Spelling. We want our children to do the best that they can, and to 'Aim High in Life!' but these tests do not measure and celebrate just how special and unique every child is in the sight of God, their families and their teachers.

I would therefore like to share with you a letter written by teachers at Buckton Vale Primary School in Cheshire that we read to our Year 6 children:

'We know how hard you have worked, but there is something very important you must know:

'The SATs test does not assess all what makes each of you special and unique. The people who create these tests and score them do not know each of you the way that we do and certainly not in the way your families do.

'They do not know that some of you speak two languages or that you love to sing or draw.

'They have not seen your natural talent for dancing or playing a musical instrument.'They do not know that your friends can count on you to be there for them; that your laughter can brighten the darkest day or that your face turns red when you feel shy.

'They do not know that you participate in sports, wonder about the future, or sometimes help your little brother or sister after school. They do not know that you are kind, trustworthy and thoughtful and that every day you try to be your very best.'

'The levels you will get from this test will tell you something, but they will not tell you everything. There are many ways of being smart.

You are smart! So, remember that there is no way to 'test' all of the amazing and awesome things that make you, YOU!'

'Sir Samuel Thomas Rosbotham, MP' by Owen Taylor

The proverbial expression, "Local Boy makes good", describes the life of Sir Samuel Thomas Rosbotham, M.P, to the letter. Known as S.T. in the neighbourhood, he was a prominent figure for over 50 years. Sir Samuel Thomas was born at Stanley Farm, on Skelmersdale Road, Bickerstaffe, (opposite the Mission), in 1864 and was educated at Rainford and Ormskirk Grammar School.

His early interest in modern farming methods led him to establish a Threshing Machine Company and Carting business.

Motivated by the social problems of his time, he became involved in local Government, joining the West Lancashire R.D.C, and later accepting an appointment as a Parish Representative on the Ormskirk Board of Guardians. He had been a Churchwarden for six years when he topped the Poll in the first Parish Council elections in 1894 and was elected Chairman on no less than 15 occasions. Almost every document, official or otherwise, concerning the Church, Parish or Leisure Activities, throughout this period, carried his name or signature.

During the First World War, he made appeals for recruits, on behalf of the South West Lancashire Regiment. At one meeting, on August 4th 1915, he indicated his forthrightness, when he said, "What has Bickerstaffe done for the War?" and "What Bickerstaffe has left undone." He then disclosed, "In the Ormskirk end of the Parish, nearly every available man has joined up", adding, "Let the other men of the village follow their example".

After the Armistice, his popularity went from strength to strength and in 1929, he was adopted as Labour Candidate in the Ormskirk Parliamentary Division. The May result gave him a 2,589 majority over his opponent, Mr F N Blundell. In the serious financial crisis of 1931,

'Alderman' Rosbotham, was one of many Labour M.P's who crossed the floor of the House, to join the Opposition ranks, thus causing the downfall of Ramsey MacDonald's Government.

Some staunch Labour voters were so infuriated by his defection that they protested, by wearing their jackets inside out, when he addressed a Public Meeting at Skelmersdale. There were jubilant scenes in Ormskirk, when the 1931 election results were declared. S.T. (National Labour Party), was re-elected, with a massive 20,253 majority over the official Labour Candidate, Mr F.V King. During his second term of office, S.T. was instrumental in the legislation of the Bill, which led to the Agriculture and Fisheries Act. The greatest moment of his career came in 1933, when a Knighthood was conferred on him in the Honours List. After retirement, he moved to Southport. He died on the 12th March, 1950 and was interred at Bickerstaffe.

We are still reminded of his lasting legacies to the Parish today. Bickerstaffe Mission was built by S.T. in 1904 and the Church Bells were a gift in 1933.
