Letter from Andrew Housley

Dear friends,

So may you all have a wonderful summer of sharing peace with those you may meet on your holidays and, if you see the Housley's towing their caravan, remember to 'toot, toot, wave.'

Meet Ove. He's a curmudgeon, the kind of man who points at people he dislikes as if they were burglars caught outside his bedroom window. He has staunch principles, strict routines, and a short fuse. People call him *the bitter neighbor from hell*, but must Ove be bitter just because he doesn't walk around with a smile plastered to his face all the time?

Behind the cranky exterior there is a story and a sadness. So when one November morning a chatty young couple with two chatty young daughters move in next door and accidentally flatten Ove's mailbox, it is the lead-in to a comical and heartwarming tale of unkempt cats, unexpected friendship, and the ancient art of backing up a U-Haul. All of which will change one cranky old man and a local residents' association to their very foundations.

A feel-good story in the spirit of *The Unlikely Pilgrimage of Harold Fry* and *Major Pettigrew's Last Stand*, Fredrik Backman's novel about the angry old man next door is a thoughtful and charming exploration of the profound impact one life has on countless others.

'Notable Events' By Owen Taylor

Throughout the centuries many notable events in and around Bickerstaffe have been documented. Understandably, the weather is often mentioned.

The rare Gibson's Cavaliers Note-Book tells of a severe hail-storm in August 1662, 'that killed pigeons, spoiled crops of wheat and split the boughs of trees'. Nathanial Heywood, Vicar of Ormskirk, wrote, 'Hailstones were as big as apples, some up to nine inches in circumference'.

Recorded too, are the 'great freezes that occurred in the latter years of George III reign. On February 2nd 1795, Bickerstaffe farmer Henry Jenkinson, reported, 'The stock of wheat will be consumed, if not assisted from abroad, by the time the new lot comes to market, or before....Potatoes are also expected to be dearer through damage and severe frost.'


Also in 1881, temperatures dropped so low that ships had to battle through thick ice on the River Mersey. The same scenario happened again in 1895, when the frozen shores of the Mersey were captured in a painting by local artist, Frederik Yorke, whose family later gave permission for it to be used on a Christmas card.

The heaviest snow-fall in living memory struck the neighbourhood and surrounding districts on January 21st -22nd 1940, causing many difficulties for Parishioners, both young and old. Snow-drifts, 12ft deep, reached bedroom windows at Barrow Nook. Construction company, Holloway Bros, who were employed by the M.O.D at Kirkby, despatched every available bulldozer to clear the roads, by the following weekend, all thoroughfares were declared open. There were no reports in the local press due to war-time secrecy.

Crime and Public disorders are often mentioned. There were Colliery riots at Skelmersdale in 1881, in which Bickerstaffe miners were involved. A further, widespread strike took place in 1912, when coal production was halted for a week or so.

On December 17th 1901, John Harrison was executed at Kirkdale Prison, for the murder of Ann Wright of Bickerstaffe. The crime took place in an abode known as Rose Cottage, near a footpath from Gorsey Bank to Skelmersdale Road. During the sentence, he interrupted the Judge, with the words, 'I am not guilty Sir'.

Early aviation feats captured public imagination. A flight by Italian Balloonist, Vincent Lunardi, was described as a 'wondrous enterprise'. Adventurous Lunardi landed in a Simonswood field on May 17th 1785, after an ascent from the old Fort at Liverpool. On May 22nd 1930, a local diarist recorded flight over the Parish of the giant Air-ship, R.100 and in October 1944, a captured German Heinkel 115 sea-plane was observed flying over Barrow Nook at low altitude, being escorted towards Liverpool by one of our fighter planes. The enemies' insignia had been concealed with white paint.

Perhaps the most unnerving event took place on September 7th 1940, a few days after Premier Churchill had inspired the nation with the words 'Let us go forward together'. The scare arose after a message was

received at Home Guard Command, that the invasion of Britain was imminent. This spurred the local Battalion into immediate action. Runners were ordered to contact all members and inform them to report to Headquarters at Bickerstaffe School and be at the ready for operational duty. Church bells were rung in many parts of the country, but not locally. Later Government Officials tried to find out why the alarm was given and who sanctioned it, but seemingly no-one was ever censured for the action.
