The Dancing Years By Owen Taylor

'May I have this dance please?' This was the first phrase a young lad learned before his introduction to the local dance-halls of the 1940s and 50s.

Ballroom dancing was the favourite pastime during the era, deemed an ideal social asset for the boys and girls to equip themselves with in their teenage years. Once mastered, it led to many hours of enjoyment and provided a friendly environment for meeting people from all walks of life.

Each weekend quite a number of local lads travelled to Prescot Road, St. Helens, for lessons at Miss Peets School of Dancing. On their way back, they would call at Rainford Village Hall and try out the new steps learned, sometimes with favourable comments and sometimes not!

Usually, the girls sat on one side of the room and the boys on the other. Once the music struck up, the girls waited anxiously, hoping that the boy they fancied asked them to dance.

Three of the main dances were the Quickstep, the Slow-Foxtrot and the Waltz. Novelty dances were also very popular and everyone joined in the Palais-Glide.

Another dance introduced in the latter war years, was the 'Excuse Me', where an onlooker could approach a couple and request an exchange of partner. But, perhaps the dance that out-shone the rest in the popularity stakes was the 'Paul Jones', devised by a Jersey Musician in 1934. The dance involved two large circles, one of boys and the other of girls, walking in the tempo of the music, in opposite directions and when the music stopped, your new partner was facing you. Famous Band-


Leader 'Joe Loss', once remarked that lots of happy marriages resulted from this dance.

Nearly every town and village catered for the dancing public. At Ormskirk, the Drill Hall and Working Men's Institute were in constant use, whilst in Skelmersdale, a good night out could be had at the Co-op or Majestic. In most cases, local dance bands performed at their own venue. Rainford Village Hall was Tommy Turton's favourite haunt. His son played on drums and the talented alto-saxophonist Horace Iddon, would croon all the sentimental songs.

Knowsley Village Hall, engaged Jack Rimmer's accordion band, he was born at Barrow Nook and later moved to Kirkby. People would come from far and wide, to hear his unique style of playing.

A young singer, who would climb on stage and give her rendition of popular songs, was Gladys Ambrose, who subsequently starred in T.V's Brookside, as Julia Brogan.

Two other bands that could make the dancers 'trip the light fantastic' were Kirkby's Noel Powell and Skelmersdale's Bill Gregson. Both of these Band-leaders conducted larger concerns and were called upon for party dances, including Farmers' Dances and Police Balls.

With no Parish Hall, Bickerstaffe dancers relied on the boy's classroom at the C of E School.

The celebrated New Year's Eve Ball had a praiseworthy reputation. Beginning back in 1870 and by 1957, singing Auld Lang Syne, as the clock chimed midnight. In the final years, Skelmersdale Coal Merchant, Harry Simmonds, brought his seven-piece dance band to entertain the revellers. Local Farmer, Ted Ashcroft, was voluntary doorman for many

years and after refreshments, he cleared up and collected any left-overs to take home for his pigs!

The advent of Rock and Roll, signalled the demise of the local dance halls and most weekly dances had ended by the 1960s.
